CODE OF CONDUCT

1 Introduction

- 1.1 This Code of Conduct ("The Code") has been adopted by the Council as required by Section 27 of the Localism Act 2011 ("The Act")
- 1.2 The Council has a statutory duty under the Act to promote and maintain high standards of conduct by members and co-opted members of the Council ("Members") and the Code sets out the standards that the Council expects Members to observe.
- 1.3 The Code is not intended to be an exhaustive list of all the obligations that are placed on members. It is the responsibility of individual members to comply with the provisions of the Code as well as such other legal obligations as may apply to them from time to time.

The Code is consistent with the following principles (the Nolan Committee Seven Principles of Public Life)

Integrity	Honesty
Objectivity	Leadership

2 Who does the Code apply to?

The code applies to all Members of the Council and all co-opted members of any committee, sub-committee or joint committee of the Council.

3 When does the Code apply?

The Code applies whenever a person is acting in their official capacity as a Member of the Council or co-opted member in the conduct of the Council's business or acting as a representative of the Council.

4 What standards of Conduct are Members expected to observe?

Selflessness

- 4.1 Members must always act in the public interest.
- 4.2 Members must never use their position as a member of the Council improperly to secure for themselves or any other person an advantage or disadvantage.
- 4.3 Members must not use the Council's resources improperly for personal or party-political purposes.

Integrity

- 4.4 Members must not do anything which compromises, or is likely to compromise, the impartiality of those who work for, or on behalf of the Council.
- 4.5 Members must not disclose information given to them in confidence.

Objectivity

- 4.6 When making decisions on behalf of the Council, including awarding contracts or making appointments, Members must do so on merit.
- 4.7 Members must have regard to any relevant advice provided to them by the Clerk to the Council and, where a separate appointment is made, to the Responsible Financial Officer (RFO).

Accountability

- 4.8 Holders of Public Office are accountable for their decisions and actions to the public and must submit themselves to whatever scrutiny is appropriate to their office.
- 4.9 Members must act in accordance with their legal obligations including the following Acts of Parliament that confer special obligations on elected Councillors:
 - Local Government Act 1972
 - Employment Rights Act 1996
 - Data Protection Act 2018
 - Freedom of Information Act 2000
 - Bribery Act 2010
 - Equality Act 2010
 - Localism Act 2011
- 4.10 Members must act in accordance with the Council's policies and reasonable requirements, including any protocols and codes of practice that may apply (e.g. in respect of Member/Officer Relations, Social Media Policy etc.)

Openness

- 4.11 Members must give reasons for any decisions taken on behalf of the Council in accordance with any statutory requirements and the Council's Standing Orders.
- 4.12 Members must not prevent another person from gaining access to information to which that person is entitled by Law.

Honesty

- 4.13 Members must declare any disclosable pecuniary and non-pecuniary interests that may arise in respect of their responsibilities as a Member of the Council.
- 4.14 Members must at all times ensure that their claims for expenses, allowances and their use of facilities and services provided by the Council are strictly in accordance with the rules laid down on these matters.

Leadership

- 4.15 Members should promote and support the Nolan Principles of Public Life by Leadership and example.
- 4.16 Members must set an example by their behaviour and shall act in a way that enhances public trust and confidence in the integrity of the Council and its members.
- 4.17 Members must show respect and courtesy to others.

- 4.18 Members should value the Council's officers and work alongside them to achieve the Council's objectives.
- 4.19 In their dealings with Council employees, Members must have regard to the Council's protocol; on Member/Officer Relations and on no account should they behave in a manner that might constitute bullying/harassment.

5. Register of Interests

- 5.1 The Monitoring Officer of Central Bedfordshire Council maintains a register of interests for Members and co-opted members of the Council.
- 5.2 The Council has determined what interest Members are required to enter in the register of Interests, including those disclosable pecuniary interests prescribed by regulations. These disclosable interests are listed in Schedule 1 (attached).
- 5.3 Members must notify the Monitoring Officer of any disclosable pecuniary and nonpecuniary interests that should be recorded in the Council's register of interests.
- 5.4 Within 28 days of becoming a Councilor, all members must submit to the Monitoring Officer a list of their disclosable interest and must notify the Monitoring Officer of any changes as and when they arise.
- 5.5 As an over-riding obligation, members are required to abide by the Law and the Nolan Committee's Seven Principles of Public Life in determining whether any additional interests should be disclosed.
- 5.6 Members must disclose when present at meetings of the Council, the Executive and all committees, sub-committees and joint committees, if they have a pecuniary or other interest in an item of business on the agenda of the meeting and the nature of the interest. Where the interest constitutes a disclosable pecuniary interest, the member is to withdraw from the meeting during consideration and voting on that item of business.

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
